## Tuesday Talks/DwD: Can We Advance Healthspan Effectively and Sustainably with AI?

#### **Tuesday 27 January**

18:20 - 21:00, Dining Hall

Generative AI offers unprecedented tools to reshape health, promising to improve outcomes, access, and efficiency by creating new solutions for both patient self-care and clinical practice (a model known as the co-production of health). AI agents are also accelerating opportunities for start-ups to bring new innovations to market at an unprecedented pace.

<u>Dr Vivian Lee</u>, Visiting Fellow at Reuben College, will explore how these can align with global goals to advance healthspan. However, the massive energy and data infrastructure required to train and run these advanced models create a significant, often overlooked, environmental footprint. We will close with a discussion of a framework for evaluating AI health solutions that prioritize both human and planetary wellbeing.

## Tuesday Talks/DwD: The Case for Climate Reparations

#### **Tuesday 24 February**

18:20 - 21:00, Dining Hall

In 2025, the International Court of Justice (ICJ) - known as the World Court - issued a landmark decision on climate change in its biggest ever case, making clear that countries need to rapidly cut emissions to reduce warming to 1.5C. The Court also held that if countries fail to act, they could be liable to pay reparations.

In this lecture, <u>Harj Narulla</u>, Visiting Fellow at Reuben College and a leading global expert in climate litigation, will draw on his experience as counsel for Solomon Islands before the ICJ to map out the case for climate reparations.


## WEEK 8

#### **Bookings**

Tickets and guest tickets can only be booked by Reuben members using a Reuben email address. All guests must attend the event with a Reuben member; anyone found to have booked guest tickets without being present themselves will have these places cancelled.

#### **Dietary Requirements & Allergies**

If you have any dietary requirements and/or allergies, please ensure these are noted on your booking for <u>every event</u> you book onto. They will not be transferred across between bookings.

#### **Pronouns**

You may have noticed that we are asking, when booking onto events, whether you would like to include your pronouns on your place cards. **But why?** 

Pronouns are words we use in everyday language to refer to ourselves or others. They can be an important way to express your gender identity. 'I', 'me', 'she/her', 'he/him' and 'they/them' are some examples of pronouns. Some trans and gender non-conforming people may use 'they', 'them' and 'theirs' as personal pronouns. 'They' is considered a gender-neutral pronoun, compared to pronouns like 'he/him' or 'she/her' which are generally perceived as gendered terms.

Pronouns can be used to role model trans allyship, allowing others to see that inclusion is a key component of our College culture. For more information on why you might like to introduce yourself with your pronouns, and how to be inclusive of others doing so, please see here:
